## From the Pastor...

I am pleased to announce that beginning Sunday, March 1 at 4:00 p.m. we will offer Dave Ramsey's Financial Peace University. Financial Peace University (FPU) is designed to teach you and your family how to get out of debt, stay out of debt, and build wealth. This is a 13-week series that will meet through the month of June (taking weeks off for Spring Break, etc.). The session will last for 2 hours from 4:00-6:00 p.m., and child care will be available. The cost of each membership kit is \$93 per family. However, we are asking that you pay only \$50, and the church will pay the remaining \$43 balance. So that we can order the correct number of family membership kits, we are asking for your registration deposit of \$50 to be paid to the church office by February 16.

## Life History

In a recent confirmation class, Forrest Foxworth gave each of those attending eight sheets of paper. We were to tell our life history using one sentence or a drawing on each sheet that would be descriptive of a significant time in our lives. Putting our life story on eight sheets of paper (small, at that) was a challenge, but possible. I thought about the importance of this exercise for everyone, especially the older members in our church. After all, our stories are a part of God's story. This is a story we need to hear over and over again. Through our stories, we share ways in which God has had a part in our lives. We see how we have matured physically, mentally, and spiritually. Developmental psychologist Erik Erickson has written a model for human development. He points out that the final developmental task is to obtain ego integrity or end up in despair. Writing our life story helps us to examine our lives and claim our story as a part of God's story. The end result is ego integrity. Our written story is a way to leave a legacy. We are told in Hebrews 12:1 that "we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses." When we go to join this cloud of witnesses, we leave our legacy in our stories to the younger generation. From the stories I have heard from older adults, there would be some incredible legacies left to nurture a younger generation. The model would be there for the younger generation to write their stories. Just be ready to write more than eight pages with one sentence on each page.

## Choir Notes

There are now five seats in the Choir Loft available, as well as "span clean" robes with no names on them. Romaine and Bill Dickson, Edith Thomas, Gene Murphey and I have now become recruiters for the Choir. I have always guessed that the Lord will not give me any credit for singing in the choir because it has been pure joy for me all these years. I thought you members of First Presbyterian Church would be interested in some brief choir history. I can only go back fifty-nine years because that is the year Gene and I moved from New Orleans to Tupelo.

At that time Miss Katie Topp was organist and choir director. We joined the church, and I joined the choir in the spring of 1950. In another article I will tell you who some of the choir members were. "Miss Katie's" twin sister, Clara, was one member.

When "Miss Katie" retired (on recommendation of our minister, Dr. McFadden), Nona Wayne Ewing took over as Organist and Choir Director. The beautiful Tracker pipe organ was the only one in Tupelo at the time. (Anyone, please correct me if I am wrong.) It was old and had survived the tornado of 1936 but still had a great sound when it worked right. Mrs. Ewing got the best out of the organ and the choir. She also taught piano – to two of the Murphey children.

Next came a young man named Jack McDaniel who directed the choir with Sandra Tallent Duncan serving as organist. I remember the choir doing an Easter Cantata, "Seven Last Words." It was quite a challenge for us, but with Jack as our leader we did well. It is such a moving and beautiful piece – I will never forget it.

Jo and Ben Orr came to First Presbyterian Church next as Choir Director and Organist. I am sorry I don't have the dates for you, but I am guessing that their first tour of duty with us was in the late 70's.

They served several years and then took a year off. During that time Wick Sparks directed the choir and our member, Evelyn Croxton, played the organ. Then Jo and Ben returned! Jo sang at both my parents' funerals and at our son Steven's wedding, and Ben was organist.

There are five more "regimes" to tell about, but I will save them for the next "Tower." Call me if you think of names I should add.

The church will sell the pure water for a minimum price and will provide an education class for everybody to learn the benefits and uses of clean water. I had a wonderful time in Guatemala and met many wonderful people. Everybody was very friendly and very involved in bettering the conditions of their children's and their own lives. I enjoyed building relationships with my brothers and sisters in Christ – all people whose existence is as real as my own. Participating in this project has broadened my perspective of God's love and its limitlessness. I truly enjoyed this trip and hope I can continue to be involved with Living Waters for the World. ## From Our Kitchen to Yours:

### Olive Bruschetta

2 cups grape tomatoes, quartered  
 2 celery ribs, chopped  
 1/2 cup shredded carrots  
 1/4 cup sliced ripe olives  
 1/4 cup sliced pimiento-stuffed olives  
 1/4 cup minced fresh flat-leaf parsley  
 1/4 cup chopped red onion  
 1 teaspoon minced garlic  
 3 tablespoons olive oil  
 2 tablespoons balsamic vinegar  
 1/4 teaspoon salt  
 1/8 teaspoon pepper  
 1 loaf (1 pound) French bread baguette, sliced & toasted

In a large bowl, combine the first eight ingredients. In a small bowl, combine the oil, vinegar, salt and pepper; pour over vegetables and toss to coat. Serve on toasted baguette slices. Yield: 2-1/2 dozen. Best when prepared one day ahead (except the bread) and served at near room temperature.
